Valérie Gravel is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Plant Science, Faculty of Agricultural and Environmental Science at McGill University.

Valerie has degrees from Laval University and is also involved with Ordre des Agronomes du Québec and Quebec Society for Plant Protection.



Valerie's research interests are:

Using our expertise in the area of sustainable horticultural production systems with a specific emphasis on sheltered or greenhouse crops, our research interests include: nutrient availability and plant uptake in organic cropping systems, plant growth regulation in sustainable production systems, microbial interactions within the soil-plant-environment continuum, and biological control of diseases and pests in sustainable fruit, vegetable and ornamental crops.

Sustainable horticultural production systems with a specific emphasis on sheltered or greenhouse crops.

Sustainable production horticulture is often defined by environmentally sound cultivation practices to ensure long-term food security by promoting, among other things, a higher produce quality. Recent work has therefore concentrated on understanding the pathways leading to health-related bioactive compound accumulation in plant tissues. In fact, it is often associated with a physiological response to abiotic stress (high salinity, drought-like conditions or higher CO₂ concentrations) or biotic stress (often triggered by the soil microbial communities) similar to conditions resulting from sustainable production practices.

Our goal is to define and understand patterns of plant response to multiple simultaneous abiotic and biotic stresses.

Sale of the Canadian Journal of Plant Science to Canadian Science Publishing

As of June 2015 the Canadian Journal of Plant Science (as well as the Canadian Journal of Animal Science and Soil Science) will be published by Canadian Science Publishing (CSP). After months of negotiation an agreement was reached among the Agricultural Institute of Canada (AIC) the now former publisher of CJPS, the Societies (CSHS, Canadian Society for Agronomy and Canadian Weed Science Society) and CSP.

CSHS will now receive material benefits from this sale and transfer from both the AIC and CSP. These benefits will be for: content development, to the journal editors and conference activities (mainly for student support).

Notable Benefits

- AIC will pay CSHS \$2000 each year for a period of 5 years starting Jan 1, 2016
- CSHS, CSA and CWSS will control the mandate and scope of the Journal's content.
- Reduced page charges for society members (66% of non-member price) and reduced immediate open access fees for society members.
- Provision of financial assistance to the Editor-in-Chief (\$10000) and annual support (\$8000) of CJPS content development and conference activities (sponsorships, exhibits, travel awards for students and keynote speakers to society meetings or annual awards).
- Invitation to CSHS to become a CSP corporate member.

Requirements by CSHS

- CSHS will recognize and acknowledge AIC's contribution by having on its website the following statement "student travel to society meetings and conferences sponsored in part by the Agricultural Institute of Canada" with a link to AIC's website.
- Continue to oversee the review of submitted manuscripts.
- Commit to optimizing the quality and status of the journal.
- Provision of free advertising space on the CSHS website to promote journal products and services and provide a link from the CSHS website to the CJPS website.
- Adopt and promote CJPS as CSHS official publication for research papers.

What is Plant Canada?



Plant Canada is an umbrella organization for seven Canadian plant societies including:

- Canadian Society for Horticultural Science
- Canadian Botanical Association
- Canadian Phytopathological Society
- Canadian Society of Agronomy

- Canadian Society of Plant Biologists
- Canadian Weed Science Society
- Canadian Association for Plant Biotechnology

The purposes of Plant Canada, a not-for-profit corporation are:

- a) To organize and sponsor regular, effective scientific meetings and workshops under a national umbrella for plant science and related disciplines in Canada,
- b) To operate and maintain a strong communication network among Member Societies and their individual members, and
- c) To be a strong and effective force for public education and advocacy in plant and related sciences.

Plant Canada holds national scientific meeting once every four years with one of its seven member societies hosting the conference. This past year it was with the Canadian Botanical Association and in four years (2019) a joint conference will be organized with another Canadian society. To support conference activities, Plant Canada gave member societies \$2000 each for both symposium expenses and a student travel award. As well, Plant Canada also rented an exhibitor's booth, sponsored its own symposium and supported a mixer.

5. Report from Officers

Report from President: In the past one year, CSHS published quarterly newsletter and took active role in publishing papers in the Canadian Journal of Plant Science. The significant role of the Society made a decision for selling the Journal to the Canadian Science Publishing (CSP) and necessary agreements have been made with the Agricultural Institute of Canada (AIC) and CSP. Other CSHS activities during the past one year included finalizing the CSHS By-Laws (now available on CSHS website) and taking active role in the activities of the International Society for Horticultural Science (ISHS), planning in AIC and Plant Canada decisions and organizing Botany 2015 Joint Conference in Edmonton, Alberta. The CSHS is thankful to all volunteers and the Botany 2015 organizers for their tireless efforts that made the joint conference a great success. Special thanks to the CSHS Executive Committee members (Karen - organized the CSHS presentations, Diane, Kris – arranged CSHS Invited Speakers, Valerie, Bob and Anissa) for their great help in the conference. The CSHS is thankful to Dr. Ron Howard, Dr. Mohyuddin Mirza and Dr. John Zhang for organizing the CSHS-supported workshop entitled, "Commercial Greenhouse Lighting: Techniques and Practicalities" during Botany 2015 Joint Conference in Edmonton, Alberta. Samir Debnath: The division of profits will depend on how many submitted papers from members.

b. Report from Secretary-Treasurer

The membership in 2015 was Regular: 39, Graduate: 13, Retired: 18, Life: 12 and Corporate: 1. Total of 83. This was an increase of 6 members (3 regular, 1 graduate and 2 retired) from 2014. Most members are from Ontario, followed by Saskatchewan and then Quebec.

Financial Report: As of June 30, 2015 total revenue for the year is \$5644 with \$3629 from membership fees and \$2999 from Plant Canada (for conferences expenses). Expenses for 2015 so far are: \$5362 with \$2044 for office services, \$1500 for membership in AIC, \$1094 for website construction, ISHS membership, postage, D & O Insurance, postage combined accounted for about \$700. These expenses excepting the website construction and the 30% increase in AIC membership are in line with previous years.

Balance sheet

Total assets are \$50 232, which is in line with previous years.

Current Bank Balance (June 30) is \$27 122.

Sara Williams became an extension specialist in horticulture at the U of S in 1989 and initiated programs for both home gardeners and the horticulture industry throughout Saskatchewan. Williams is the author and co-author of numerous books. Sara Williams is author of Creating the Prairie Xeriscape. Sara Williams' previous books include Perennials for the Prairies, In a Cold Land: Saskatchewan's Horticultural Pioneers, and Saskatoon Forestry Farm Park and Zoo: A Photographic History, and, with co-author Hugh Skinner, Gardening, Naturally: a chemical-free handbook for the Prairies, Best Trees and Shrubs for the Prairies and Best Groundcovers and Vines for the Prairies.

In the decade following her retirement, she has raised funds for a hostel and garden for 80 girls attending secondary school in Tanzania through an organization called the Canadian Harambee Education Society (CHES). These students are mostly from impoverished families in remote villages. The hostel provides a safe and supportive environment for their years of study and has become a model for other communities in Tanzania.

PlantingScience Awarded 2.9M National Science Foundation Grant

We are extremely excited to announce that Botanical Society of America was awarded a large NSF grant to develop and study a new model of professional development for teachers and early career scientists. The new model will include developing a sequence of in-person workshops and online learning targeted towards high school teachers new to PlantingScience and their students, as well as graduate students and postdocs. High school biology teachers and early career scientists will work collaboratively and learn from each other while they co-mentor students on student-led plant science projects through the PlantingScience online mentoring platform. Our co-PIs at the Biological Sciences Curriculum Study (BSCS) will be conducting a rigorous cohort-comparison study to measure impacts of the new model on the students, teachers, and scientist participants.

This is fantastic news for the program, as it will allow us to move to a new platform where we can support a larger number of student teams, and it will help us to evaluate, improve, publicize, and grow this powerful program. We will make use of our 10-year history and the strong existing PlantingScience community as we create new online training and professional development resources. Many of these resources will be available to the entire PlantingScience community, and will help improve the quality of projects overall and give targeted guidance to students, mentors, and teachers as they need it.

The grant will help us to provide leadership opportunities for existing PlantingScience scientist mentors, Master Plant Science Team members, and teachers to focus their acquired expertise towards training future program participants. We will be in touch by e-mail as opportunities arise.

Along with this new professional development grant, expansion in Canada thanks to increased partnership with the Canadian Botanical Association, and development of a new agriculture module in partnership with the American Society of Agronomy means we will soon be expanding our reach. In order to handle the larger number of student teams that we are anticipating, we will need more scientist mentors willing to volunteer their time and share their passion for plants and science.
